Learning to Look: The Art of Garden Observation Presented by Patterson Webster

Looking for ways to take your garden up a notch? In this program, Patterson Webster suggests three simple steps to help you get the most out of a garden visit – and how to apply the ideas to your garden at home. You will discover:

BIRDIE BITS

Heated Bird Baths

On February 4th while walking downstairs, I noticed a little Chickadee skating rather than drinking at the bird bath. Within a few hours I was able to remove the ice and add fresh water after adjusting the plug. In winter when all the natural sources of water are frozen, it can be very difficult for songbirds to find water to drink and keep their feathers clean.



Many songbirds need to drink water every day as they lose water daily through droppings, and they would quickly become dehydrated without replenishment. Birds also need the water to bath and keep their feathers clean. Keeping the feathers clean is vital to a bird's ability to stay warm. Birds puff up their feathers when the temperature drops and fluffing the feathers help insulate against the cold by adding layers of air around their bodies. To maintain these layers, a bird's feathers must be clean and healthy. Just a fraction of an inch of this insulation can help birds maintain a body temperature of 100 degrees or more in frigid temperatures. A Cardinal's normal body temperature is 106 degrees and a Chickadee's around 108 degrees.

Marilyn and I have often mentioned how important it is to have a heated bird bath available near your feeders. It is so entertaining to watch a bird taking a bath when the snow is falling. I watch the birds coming and going all day at the bath to drink and bathe. Interesting how they take turns. You will not be disappointed if you invest in a heated bird bath, and the birds will be very happy.

DUES INCREASE

The Sudbury Garden Club Board has voted to raise the dues for members for the 2023-2024 year. We did not make this decision lightly, it was discussed over 2 meetings with many pros and cons brought forward. Below are some of the factors that brought us to this decision:

Budget

We put forth a balanced budget meaning projected plant sale revenue plus membership dues equals our budget

- The projected 2023-2024 budget is about \$11,000 (to be presented to membership at Annual meeting on June 14)
- It is good practice to have at least 2 years' budget in reserves. We have a projected balance of \$25,000
- We cannot plan on the plant sale always generating a \$7000+ profit
- We have not increased the dues in 10 years

Club activities (Growth and expansion in the past 10 yrs)

• Membership has grown

• Our Community Outreach program assembles over 150 arrangements for local nursing homes and Meals on Wheels. The cost of materials, including flowers and oasis, has increased. This is a relatively new community-wide program.

• Our Civic Beautification committee works on an increased number of public gardens and containers. Though many of the plants used by our Civic Beautification Committee are donated, our other costs, including tools, hoses, soil, fertilizer, etc., have increased.

• Our Color Me Floral workshops have been attended by many members and have generated renewed interest in the Club participating in Flower Shows. Though attendees pay most of the fees, the club subsidizes a small amount. These workshops are also taught by SGC members, saving instructor costs.

• The cost of items associated with the plant sale has risen including soil, signs and the plants we buy from Brighams, Cavicchio's and Bartlett's.

• The price of flowers has increased 25-50%.

• The cost of our required insurance went up in 2023. • The cost of speakers has increased. The cost of our required insurance went up in 2023

• We have increased interest in participating in Flower Shows amongst our membership

• In addition to sending cards, our Sunshine committee funds Memorial donations in honor of deceased members, (\$100 for a member and \$50 for family member)

• As another way of providing community support, the Scholarship Committee has expressed an interest in giving additional scholarships (\$2000 budgeted for 2023).

• Costs associated with the Holiday Brunch and Annual meeting have increased including food and paper products. Fortunately, we are currently saving on venue fees by holding events at the Memorial Congregational Church versus more costly venues.

Solution
