

Permaculture 101 Presented by Dr. Kaat vander Straeten Permaculture is a set of principles and practices guided by the most successful and abundant system of all, Nature! It combines science, indigenous wisdom, living systems thinking, deep observation of place and thoughtful practice to meet human needs while regenerating the greater ecosystems in which those needs are nested. We will explore how basic permaculture principles can guide us as we design and nurture our gardens to meet our needs for food, health, fuel, shelter, energy, fun, community and culture. This talk will combine some theory, lots of practical examples, and plenty of resource materials to take home and put into practice.

Dr. Kaat vander Straeten is a Certified Permaculture Designer and teaches *Life in the Soil* classes at Sowing Solutions Permaculture Design in Western, MA. She is a local, regional and national climate activist, and at all these levels she applies permaculture principles, living systems thinking, regenerative design and scale linking. She does the same in her extensive, edible vegetable and perennial gardens, in her mushroom yard and bee yard, and in the barn where she often lectures to chickens, ducks and rabbits.

BIRDIE BITS



GOOD for birds and wildlife.



NOT GOOD for birds and wildlife!!

Messy yards are beneficial for birds and wildlife

Every morning when I walk Madeline to the end of the driveway and back, I notice more leaves have fallen, and Maddie finds one acorn that she tosses around the entire way. I often step on one in my bare feet in the house. OUCH!!

Looking at the leaves, I am not looking forward to raking, but according to the Audubon Society, a messy lawn is better for the birds and bugs. "Messy is definitely good to provide food and shelter for birds during the cold winter months," says Tod Winston, Audubon manager for plants for birds.

When fall arrives, leave the seed heads of native wildflowers that provide a helpful cache for birds. Leaving other dead plants fill your property with protein packed bird snacks in the form of insect larvae such as fly and wasp larvae the inhabit goldenrod galls.

You can help the birds and other wildlife by skipping the leaf raking. The leaves are important because they rot and enrich the soil and also provide places for bugs and birds to forage for food. Leaf litter is a habitat for a variety of critters such as salamanders, snails, worms and toads. When digging, you might notice moth pupae and left in undisturbed soil, they provide a crucial food source for birds.

Building a brush pile with the branches that fall during the storms shelter birds from lousy weather and predators. American Tree Sparrows, Black-capped Chickadees, and other wintering birds will appreciate the protection form the elements. Rabbits, snakes, and other wildlife will also take refuge there.

So this fall, save your back, and let the leaves fall where they may.

Just for your information. We have all noticed the price of food increasing, and because of the severe drought in the West and Great Plains, the price of bird seed will be increasing and certain seeds such as sunflower seeds will be hard to come by. Only 1% of the crop in North Dakota is in excellent condition. Combined with other factors like high shipping costs and the rising demand of birding grows in popularity, persistent drought could force households to reassess their bird-feeding budgets.
