A Piet Oudolf Story Presented by Deborah Chud

The first part of Deborah Chud's "A Piet Oudolf Story" traces her discovery of his work, her research on his plant combinations, and her use of that research to create a garden in his style. The second part explores the historical context in which he emerged as a landscape designer, and the final part provides an introduction to his design principles-particularly his concept of structure and the special balance he creates between coherence and contrast. Toward the end of her talk Deborah offers some practical Oudolfian "dos and don'ts" for solving the problem of excessive contrast. Deborah Chud is a retired Massachusetts physician turned landscape design consultant and educator. Her five years of research on Piet Oudolf have generated the most comprehensive existing database of his plant combinations. Last summer, she presented her work at an international event ("Piet Oudolf: How Does He Do It?") She has also presented to members the MA Horticultural Society, Harvard University's Arnold Arboretum, Toronto Botanical Gardens and the Delaware Botanic Gardens.

BIRDIE BITS



While you were sleeping...

In our yards and gardens we feel and see the seasons changing in October as Fall colors show off our maples and oaks. The air is crisp in the morning and still warm and summery by mid-afternoon. Roses still bloom alongside pumpkins and chrysanthemums. It seems a season coming to rest, and yet, all around and above us as we are sleeping, birds are taking flights of heroic proportions that

until recently, we could not have imagined.

We still don't know exactly what propels birds into the air in Spring and Fall. A German term called Zugunruhe means "migration anxiety". With changing weather and the length of daylight birds feel a restless energy. They can double their weight in a few week's time. Their blood chemistry resembles diabetics and coronary patients, and yet they suffer no harm. Reproductive organs shrink to allow room for muscle build-up. Flying non-stop for days at a time does not cause sleep deprivation. Bird brains allow the brain to "sleep" for a few seconds on one side throughout the flight. They must be ever alert as life and death challenges abound-adverse weather, loss of refueling habitat, predators, and wild game hunters to name a few.

How birds "know" a map of the world before they've ever taken their first migratory flight has long been another mystery. Magnetic iron crystals in some bird's heads indicate a form of biological compass. It now appears that birds can visualize the earth's magnetic field through a form of quantum entanglement- two particles created at the same instant, linked even light years away, may allow birds to visualize the earth's magnetic field. (Even Einstein was unsettled by this "spooky action")

This year Scott Wiedensaul published A World on the Wing, The Global Odyssey of Migratory Birds. As I wait for the first junco to appear in the yard, I've felt a whole new world open up. Wiedensaul chronicles the millions and billions of birds taking to the air on epic journeys of migration that are only now being studied. For years masses of birds have shown up on Doppler radar screens. Now with tiny geolocators birds and even Monarch butterflies can be tagged and followed. A gray cheeked thrush in Denali National Park in Alaska has been followed 6500 miles to it's wintering area in Venezuela and then followed again in the Spring as it returns to nearly the exact nesting site of the previous year in Denali. What we are learning is so amazing that we can only be left with a feeling of awe and reverence for eons of evolution that allow fragile birds " by obeying their ancient rhythms knit up the scattered and beleaguered wild places of the world into a seamless whole through the simple act of flight".
