#### Thinking Globally, Acting in Your Own Backyard Presented by Rebecca Warner

What we do in our gardens can make a difference for the environment. Rebecca will show you how to do your part to reduce pollution and energy use, conserve water, and prevent storm water runoff by replacing some of your lawn with smart, attractive alternatives. She focuses on growing less lawn as a way of cutting down on the use of fossil-fueled machinery, avoiding fertilizer and pesticides, and using space in the yard for garden beds that do more for pollinators, beneficial insects and birds. Rebecca uses locally sourced materials, such as her own compost and mulch from arborist wood chips and she prioritizes native plants to support native insects.

Rebecca Warner is a home gardener in Newton with 30 years' experience working towards a sustainable garden. Her book, The Sustainable-Enough Garden is the story of her quest to make a beautiful garden that is environmentally friendly. In the last eight years, she has overhauled her garden practices from composting to mulching, and lawn care to irrigation.

Enjoy the flowers as looking at beautiful flowers brings happiness!




#### **From our Friends - Upcoming Lectures**
