



Thank you from a scholarship recipient

Hello,

My name is Hannah and four years ago, the Sudbury Garden Club awarded me a scholarship to help fund my college education. I wanted to reach out to thank you again for this support and give you a brief update on my studies.

This spring, I will be graduating from Cornell University's College of Engineering with honors. I have been studying environmental engineering with a focus on climate change and environmental modeling. While the pandemic has been very disruptive, I've still had an incredible experience and was thrilled to return to the classroom this past fall. While I've learned a lot from all my classes, I particularly enjoyed a class called Renewable Energy Systems Engineering, which I took this past fall. In this class, I studied the various sources of renewable energy, technologies for harnessing such energy, and even worked on a project to design a solar carport at Cornell.

I have also worked in two different research labs during my time at Cornell, and in my current lab I am adapting a computer model to help predict the global atmospheric spread of fungal crop diseases. This research has been extremely rewarding and I'm so grateful to work with such incredible scientists. I'm currently writing a senior thesis on my research and plan to work for the lab after graduation to hopefully turn my thesis into a paper for publication.

Outside of the classroom, I am also passionate about working with a climate justice organization called Climate Justice Cornell. We advocate for local, state, and national policies that would help mitigate the impacts of climate change in an equitable manner. Perhaps our biggest accomplishment was in 2020 when, after almost a decade of student activism, we helped convince Cornell University to divest our endowment from the fossil fuel industry.

Looking forward, I hope to work for a national research lab, and am particularly interested in the National Renewable Energy Lab (NREL). I believe my education and passion will allow me to play a role in making our world more sustainable and just.

Thank you again for your support and I hope you have a happy and safe 2022.

Birding and Gardening in February

Doug Tallamy's book, Nature's Best Hope, a New Approach to Conservation that Starts in Your Yard, a Christmas request, still sits in a pile on my bedroom table, ready to be picked up when there's more time to read. You would think February might be that

time, but instead, I think all of us have been working harder, still trying to stay safe and sound, doing nearly everything in a different way than we did 2 years ago. It has become tedious, for sure! Instead of books, plant and bird magazines seem to be just the right size for browsing and dreaming of Spring, of planting and more time outside, maybe even with fellow gardeners if we're still heading in the right direction

Better Homes and Gardens Jan/Feb issue featured hearty hellebores. The photos are so stunning that I don't see how I can part with this magazine. In my mind, I've planted a whole hillside of hellebores for the neighbors who walk by to admire. Right now, this area has moss and whatever "weeds" 'have decided that my neglect is perfect for them.

The Jan/Feb issue of The American Gardener Magazine features Zestful Zinnias on the cover. Again, in my dreams I've planted those in a perennial bed near the driveway where I and my neighbors can see the pollinators that flock to them and the birds that will enjoy the seeds. I think of my mother with her vases all over the house filled with zinnias, sweet peas, and gladiolas. I used to think my childhood house looked like Better Homes and Gardens all summer long. I know where my dreams of a cutting garden originate. I hope my mother knows how much I benefited from growing up with her love of flowers.

I grew up with birdfeeders, too, and rows of sunflowers in the garden that attracted birds in late summer. Now Wild Birds supplies my sunflower seeds and all the banquet of suet and seeds a bird's heart can imagine! When I'm not dreaming of planting in the Spring, I'm watching the birds at the feeders and hoping the red -tailed hawk as well as the Cooper's hawk will find a meal elsewhere. For the first time we've heard ravens in the yard, and I wonder how they will fit in with the hawks and crows that nest nearby.

During the last snowstorm we had over 50 birds in a mixed flock come in for food. There were grackles, starlings, and red-winged blackbirds. In the flock there were male redwings, juvenile redwings, and a few females. I never remember seeing them this early. There were so many that when they spooked and flew off into the trees, there was an audible whirling of wings.

We've had bluebirds and robins all winter. The robins dined on the winter berries that I bought from Russell's Garden Center to fill my deck planters. So did the bluebirds! Both species have loved the heated deck bird bath, taking vigorous baths even in temps well below freezing. Now on warm days, the bluebirds are beginning to inspect

the bluebird houses. The real estate market is hot with limited numbers of houses available!

It seems obvious that our gardens are very connected with bird life and insect life. Our bird and garden sources give us permission not to be as tidy in our gardens and to be more aware of natives and pollinators. In some ways, I feel that I've gone back to my country roots where we had no exotic plants or trees in our gardens. Childhood memories are beginning to inform more of my gardening practices now. I just hope we can bring back some of the endangered butterflies and bees and birds that we took for granted not so long ago.

Since we can't plant outside quite yet, there are some wonderful programs and exhibits in the local area coming up soon. The Concord Museum is featuring "Alive with Birds", a collaboration with Mass Audubon Society featuring William Brewster, the first President of Mass Audubon from March 4-September 5. Visit concordmuseum.org.

Elm Bank, MA Horticultural Society's Gardens in Wellesley, is featuring winter guided tours on March 2 and 9, from 10-11 AM. Tours feature winter garden interest with an eye out for what will be happening soon in the Spring. Visit **masshort.org**.

Tower Hill Botannical Gardens is always a great getaway in the last of winter with the orangerie and limonaia ablaze with colorful plants and fragrant blooms. Visit **towerhillbg.org**.

Spring really is just around the corner, right after the foot of snow that came in on Friday, February 25th! I plan to curl up with more garden and bird magazines and dream of having the most beautiful bird-filled gardens ever this Spring. We hope you have Spring dreams, too.
